Discover the Heart of April House: A Safe Haven for Children

Many of you have heard of April House, but may not fully know what we do. Since April is Child Abuse Prevention Month, it's the perfect time to share the important work we do as a Child Advocacy Center (CAC) serving Whiteside County and beyond.

As a nonprofit organization, our mission is to support children and families impacted by child abuse. Our small but dedicated team—a Director, Forensic Interviewer, and Advocate—works closely with law enforcement, prosecutors, DCFS, medical professionals, and therapists to coordinate child abuse cases, including child sexual abuse, severe physical abuse, risk of harm, child abuse materials, and youth witnesses to violence.



At April House, children and their non-offending caregivers find a safe, child-friendly space where they receive compassionate advocacy, forensic interviews, and referrals to vital support services.

Our Services

Forensic Interviews: Our highly trained forensic interviewer provides a safe, supportive space for children to share their experiences in their own words, at their own pace. These interviews play a critical role in investigations, often preventing children from being questioned multiple times or having to testify in court.

Advocacy & Support: Our dedicated advocate walks alongside families—connecting caregivers to traumainformed therapy, forensic medical exams, and other vital resources to aid in the healing journey.

Our Impact in 2024

254 children received services (64 physical abuse, 188 sexual abuse, 6 other)
141 forensic interviews conducted
390 family members received support
120 DCFS investigations assisted
75 children referred to counseling

Did You Know?

April House is one of 41 Child Advocacy Centers in Illinois We host monthly case review meetings to address updates and barriers. Our funding comes from grants, United Way, fines, fees, fundraisers, and donations (all tax-deductible!) Every child who visits receives a new blanket and toy. We are nationally accredited by the National Children's Alliance We offer presentations for organizations, workplaces, church groups, and more!
