Chamber Champion: LeAndra Hartman

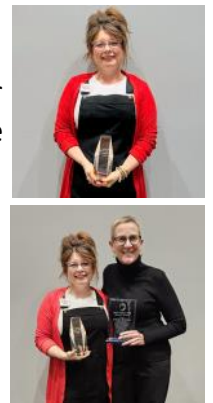

Sauk Valley Community Leadership Program (SVCLP)

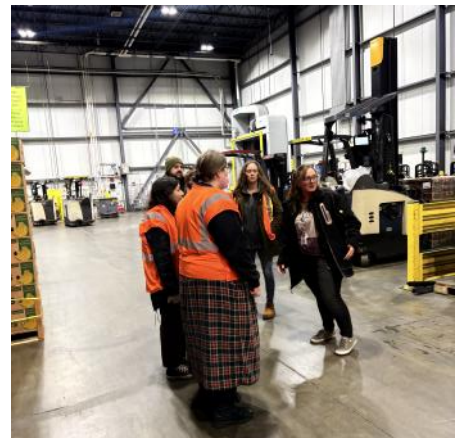

We were proud to distribute grants to 17 FFA chapters and organizations over the past few months and are exploring ways to continue support in the future.

We wish the other event success. When it comes to supporting our youth, there is room for shared purpose, and we hope the community will continue to support opportunities that benefit students across the Sauk Valley.

Thank you again for your decades of support, trust, and partnership. We look forward to staying connected and sharing future opportunities to support the next generation.
