Tariffs are having a real and devastating impact on thousands of small businesses across the nation as uncertainty, rising costs, and cancellations are hitting home.

In a recent special event for small business owners, U.S. Chamber of Commerce Executive Vice President, Chief Policy Officer, and Head of Strategic Advocacy Neil Bradley and Senior Vice President, Head of International, John Murphy, shared the latest on tariffs and how they are impacting small businesses.

The duo broke down trade tariffs, what is tariffed, what is not, and what might happen next.

Bradley explained that these tariffs differ from other previous tariffs. "We're used to some level of tariffs in history and commerce," Bradley said. "The tariffs that are being imposed this year fall under the International Emergency Economic Powers Act (IEEPA). The benefit from the administration's perspective is that it doesn't require notice or public comment to make changes."
